## Art & Design

This guide provides some examples of resources you may need to cite in your work. For more examples and further information about referencing, quoting and paraphrasing, use ***Cite Them Right Online***.

It is important to check with your tutor if in any doubt about using references in your work.

<h2>22. Secondary Referencing</h2> <p>Where you can it is always better to refer to an <b>original source</b>. This means if you want to use a quote or idea by <i>another author</i> referred to in a book/journal you are reading, try to find and use the publication this came from. Where this is not possible you will use <i>secondary referencing</i> and you need to show this in your in-text citation.</p> <p>For more information see <i>Cite Them Right Online: Basics</i></p>
